Trump Dips a Point, Now Trailing Biden by 4 pts in Minnesota Polling, But 'Undecided' Picks it Up, Now at 11%, 35 Weeks From Election Day:

SurveyUSA's latest tracking poll for KSTP-TV in Minneapolis, WDIO-TV in Duluth, and KAAL-TV in Rochester shows Democratic incumbent Joe Biden edging Republican former President Donald Trump by 4 points in Minnesota, 42% to 38%, leaving Biden 3 points behind where he finished in the North Star State in 2020, when he defeated Trump by 7 points.

Compared to identical SurveyUSA polling released [one month ago](#), Biden is flat, Trump down one point. The number of voters who say they will vote for another candidate remains steady (and higher than SurveyUSA would call plausible) at 9%; the number of voters who say they are undecided increases by 1 point to 11%. That movement from Trump and toward undecided is too small to be necessarily indicative of anything in particular.

Among [men](#), Trump today leads by 10 points; among [women](#), Biden leads by 18 – a 28-point gender gap, wider than the 17-point gap seen in last month's poll. 87% of Republicans vote for Trump, 87% of Democrats for Biden; independents are divided, with 29% voting for Biden today, 26% for Trump, 21% for another candidate, and 23% undecided. On the issues, Biden leads overwhelmingly among voters who say gun control (a 59-point lead) or abortion (58 points) are most important, leads significantly among those who say health care is most important (31 points); Trump leads overwhelmingly among voters focused on immigration (60%), significantly among those focused on government spending (24 points), taxes (17 points), and the economy (16 points). Crime-focused voters are evenly split.

Democratic Incumbent US Senator Amy Klobuchar, running for a fourth term, is 16 points ahead of Republican Navy vet and banker Joe Fraser, defeating him 49% to 33% in a hypothetical matchup today, with 5% looking to another candidate and 14% undecided. Last month, when SurveyUSA tested Klobuchar against a generic Republican, the top-line numbers were identical, 49% D, 33% R. These numbers will likely tighten, should Fraser be the nominee, as his name recognition increases; today, 14% of Republicans and 12% of conservatives are undecided, compared to 6% of Democrats and 4% of liberals.

Democrats increase their lead in generic Minnesota House contests; last month, 44% of likely voters said they would vote for a Democrat in their Minnesota House District, 41% for a Republican; today, 46% say they will vote for a Democrat, 41% for a Republican; 3% for another candidate. 11% are undecided.

Should the 2024 ballot include an amendment including the right to an abortion in the state constitution, 58% of likely voters say they would vote "yes" on that measure, 25% no; 17% say they are undecided. "No" leads "Yes" by 61 points among those who say there are no cases where abortion should be legal; by 38 points among very conservative voters; by 30 points among those who say abortion should be illegal except in cases of rape, incest, or to save a mother's life; by 14 points among those who say immigration is the most important issue in the 2024 election; by 11 points among Republicans; by 10 points among 2020 Trump voters, and by single digits elsewhere.

About the Research / Filtering: SurveyUSA interviewed 2,075 total adults from the state of Minnesota 02/23/24 through 02/28/24. Of the adults, 1,837 were identified as being registered to vote; of the registered voters, 1,603 were determined by SurveyUSA to be likely to vote in the November general election and were asked the substantive questions which follow. This research was conducted online, using nonprobability sample of online adult panelists chosen randomly by Lucid Holdings LLC of New Orleans. The combined pool of survey respondents was weighted to US Census CPS targets for gender, age, race, and education; to US Census ACS targets for home ownership, and to recalled 2020 presidential vote. Statement of Methodology: SurveyUSA is an independent, non-partisan, apolitical research company that conducts opinion surveys for media, academic institutions, commercial clients, non-profits, governments, agencies, and elected officials. SurveyUSA opinion research is conducted using a methodology optimized for each particular project. In some cases, this means data is collected 100% by telephone; in some cases, 100% online; and in other cases, a blend of the two. For those projects that are conducted "mixed-mode" (or "multi-mode"): Respondents who have a home (landline) telephone are interviewed by phone, sometimes using live interviewers, other times using the recorded voice of a professional announcer. The youngest male is requested on approximately 30% of calls to home phones, the youngest adult is requested on approximately 70% of calls. This method of intra-household selection reduces the potential for age and gender imbalance in the unweighted sample. Re-attempts are made to busy signals, no-answers, and answering machines. Landline telephone sample is purchased from Aristotle of Washington DC. Respondents who do not use a home telephone are interviewed on an electronic device, which means, for some projects, that call-center employees hand-dial cell phones and interview respondents verbally on the respondent's cell phone, and means, for other projects, that SurveyUSA displays the questions visually on the respondent's phone, tablet, or other device. Sample for respondents who do not use a home telephone is purchased from Aristotle or from one of several other research companies that provide access to cell respondents. Where meaningful, SurveyUSA indicates the percentage of respondents who use a home phone and the percentage who do not, and crosstabs by this distinction. Responses are minimally weighted to U.S. Census or voter file targets for gender, age and race. Target (cell) weighting is used. On questionnaires that ask about political party identification, SurveyUSA may or may not weight to Party ID, depending on client preference. Where necessary, questions and answer choices are rotated to prevent order bias, recency, and latency effects. On some studies, certain populations are over-sampled, so that the number of unweighted respondents exceeds the number of weighted respondents. Each individual SurveyUSA release contains the date(s) on which interviews are conducted and a release date. If interviewing for a particular study is conducted in Spanish, or in any other foreign language, it will be noted on the specific release. If no notation appears, interviews are conducted in English. Where respondents are filtered, such as adults, filtered to registered voters, in turn filtered to likely voters, SurveyUSA describes the filtering on the specific release. On pre-election polls in geographies with early voting, SurveyUSA differentiates between respondents who have already voted and those who are likely to vote but have not yet done so. On research completed prior to 12/31/16, SurveyUSA assigned to each question within the instrument a theoretical margin of sampling error. Effective 01/01/17, SurveyUSA assigns to each question within the instrument a credibility interval, which better reflects the sampling uncertainties associated with gathering some percentage of respondent answers using non-probability sample. Though commonly cited in the presentation of research results, "sampling error" is only one of many types of error that may influence the outcome of an opinion research study. More practical concerns include the way in which questions are worded and ordered, the inability to contact some, the refusal of others to be interviewed, and the difficulty of translating each questionnaire into all possible languages and dialects. Non-sampling errors cannot be quantified. This statement conforms to the principles of disclosure as recommended by the National Council on Public Polls (NCPP).
