

Minnesota AMBER Alert Plan

Criteria

- 1. Law enforcement officials have a reasonable belief that an abduction has occurred.
- 2. Law enforcement officials believe that the child is in imminent danger of serious bodily injury or death.
- 3. Enough descriptive information exists about the victim and the abductor for law enforcement to issue an AMBER Alert.
- 4. The victim of the abduction is a child age 17 years or younger.
- 5. The child's name and other critical data elements have been entered into the National Crime Information Center (NCIC) system.

Request for an AMBER Alert Activation

- If local law enforcement agencies confirm a child abduction meets all AMBER Alert criteria, they should gather as much information as possible and contact the MN Bureau of Criminal Apprehension (BCA), 24-hour Operations Center at 651-793-7000.
 - When and where the child was abducted
 - A description of the child
 - A description of the abductor and/or vehicle
 - Photos of the child and abductor, if available
- A BCA Special Agent is Charge (SAIC) will verify that an AMBER Alert is warranted and work with the requesting law enforcement agency to prepare a notification for public dissemination.
 - If the child abduction meets the AMBER Alert criteria, the BCA will move forward with an AMBER Alert activation.
 - If the child abduction does not meet the criteria at the time of request, the BCA can activate the secondary alerting system and issue a Missing Person Alert.
- If the AMBER Alert is met, the BCA will work to activate the AMBER Alert.
 - AMBER Alert form completed and sent through the MN Crime Alert Network
 - Issue an EAS message through IPAWS
 - Issue a WEA, sent via NCMEC
 - Notify MN Department of Transportation for road signs
 - NCIC AMBER Alert message
 - DPS and BCA Websites/Social Media (Facebook, Twitter, Instagram)
 - Notify all secondary partners
